Every sortie, every simulator lesson, every scolding by my instructors, had led to this day. When the day came for my first solo flight on 1 Apr 21 and as I stepped into the Ops Room, I became nervous. But I stood firm because all the training and mental flying had prepared me for this day. During solo check flight, the wind direction changed, and runway changed from 03 to 21. This made me more nervous as most of my circuit training was using runway 03. There was nothing that I could do but to adapt quickly to the new reference points for runway 21. After assuring my instructor that I could land the aircraft safely, we landed and proceeded to A55 parking bay. My instructor alighted from the aircraft, and I gave him the thumbs up and he walked up to ATC tower. I told myself that I would not commit any mistakes and to keep myself and everyone in the circuit safe.

My first solo flight pattern was tight as there were many aircraft in the circuit. I kept calm and brought the aircraft back on ground safely. As I placed a magnet tag on the flying progress for the completion of first solo, the sense of achievement and the congratulatory words



from all the instructors were rewarding. Looking back on the previous flights, I understood why instructors put so much emphasis on safety and flying the aircraft properly. I looked back with a smile and after taking my first solo flight photo with my instructor, I went home with a big smile with no regrets.
